

# Irish Catholic Churches

## Berthier, Champlain, Joliette, Maskinongé, Montcalm, Nicolet, St-Maurice, Terrebonne, Yamaska Counties

### Berthier County

Berthier a county, a region which was organized in the glory days of the seigniorial era of New France. From 1770 to 1781, James Cuthbert acquired a number of French seigneuries in Berthier and Maskinongé counties, thus opening lands to families from the British Isles, including an appreciable number of Irish.

**Berthierville - Sainte Geneviève** - Organized in 1727, Irish families were present in the region from about the 1830s onward

### Champlain County

Shawinigan, a city with numerous industries dependent on a nearby supply of hydro-electric power, attracted a great number of English-speaking Canadians, Americans and British and Irish families.

### **Joliette County**

Many of the industries in this county were first started by Barthélemy Joliette, a seigneur, notary, investor and entrepreneur who attracted European families to the region, among them the Irish. Joliette appears to have been a positive influence with the French Canadians and Acadians in the county, and with English-speaking residents, among them the Irish.

### **Maskinongé County**

Saint-Gabriel-de-Brandon was first settled by British soldiers, Loyalist families, American families who were not Loyalists, a few Scottish families and Irish Catholic families. The number of Irish was second to the French in the late 18<sup>th</sup> century in this region. The town was first named Brandon by American or British settlers.

**Brandon - St-Gabriel-de-Brandon – Saint Gabriel** - Organized in 1839, the Irish were present from that period of time onward

**Louiseville - Rivière du Loup-en-Haut - Saint Antoine de Rivière du Loup** - Organized in 1714; Irish and Scottish pioneers were settlers in the region prior to 1781. For example, the son of Daniel and Mary Forbes was married in 1781 to Marian McDowell in the Catholic church of Sorel, located across the St. Lawrence River from Louiseville.

### **Montcalm County**

The former lumber town of Rawdon is the cultural and economic heart of Lanaudière's remaining English-speaking population. The region was first established in 1815 by Irish,

Scottish, English and French settlers. Rawdon's Irish Catholics established two internationally renowned schools. St-Anne's Convent on Lake Morgan Road, which dates to Confederation, and St-Anselme's Academy on Queen Street, founded in 1910. In the early 1830's this region, then known as Rawdon, Joliette, Berthier and Terrebonne Counties, was highly recommended by the Port Authority in Quebec as a destination of choice for Irish immigrants wishing to become farm owners. The towns of Rawdon, Kilkenny, Kildare and Brandon were singled out in such a document, dated 1832, handed to Irish immigrants upon their arrival at Quebec City.

**Chertsey – Saint Théodore** - Organized in 1858; in 1854 Irish families resided in the region

### **Nicolet County**

Located across the St. Lawrence River from Trois-Rivières, and north of Drummond County; very few Irish farmers settled in the region. In 1847, a group of Irish immigrants settled into the parish of Saint-Zéphirin-de-Courval. Other towns were Aston, Blandford, Horton, although it appears that the number of Irish families were few in numbers and their periods of residence might have been short-lived.

### **St-Maurice**

The Irish families arrived in the Trois-Rivières region from about 1830 and onward. Through inter-marriage, the Irish presence in Trois-Rivières is still a positive contribution to the mosaic of this central Quebec city.

**Pointe du Lac – La Visitation** - Organized in 1742, about 1830, Irish families were present in the region. In the 1830s, the Lower Canada government in Quebec City recommended the region of Three Rivers to Irish immigrants wanting to settle on farmlands. The town of Pointe-du-Lac was most likely the first to receive the Irish.

The county of Terrebonne welcomed Irish families from about 1830, perhaps a few years earlier. To this day one can encounter descendants of the original families. Most if not all have fully integrated into the Québec culture.
